Seeing the Unseen: Improving access to abortion care in humanitarian settings, Ethiopia

This research project aims to evaluate the implementation of person-centered comprehensive abortion care (CAC) among internally displaced women in Ethiopia. It will explore the sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) needs and preferences of IDW; measure the impact of personcentered midwifery-led CAC on experience of care and autonomy, clinical outcomes, contraceptive utilization, and cost-effectiveness; and explore barriers and opportunities for implementation.

Background

Internally displaced women are especially marginalized and vulnerable to poor access to contraceptives, unintended pregnancies, and subsequent unsafe abortion. A personcentered care approach is critical to delivering high-quality reproductive health services.

In Ethiopia, there is potential for significant humanitarian impact if the health system is supported to provide personcentered comprehensive abortion care. However, evidence is needed to inform feasible and sustainable implementation.

Expected outcomes

This study aims to influence the uptake of evidence-based abortion care in war-affected areas, so that women and girls affected by the civil war affected region can access costeffective quality, person-centered comprehensive abortion care. The study will deliver:

- Evidence which supports policymakers to understand reproductive needs and preferences of internally displaced women in the community.
- Evidence to guide midwifery policy and practices and inform effective, cost-effective and sustainable implementation.
- Increased visibility and credibility of the midwifery profession as providers of person-centered CAC.
- The Ethiopian Federal Ministry of Health and humanitarian partners will support and empower midwives to function within their scope of practice in abortion care.

About the research

- The research project will employ mixed methods and entail three concurrent studies in seven waraffected administrative zones of the Amhara region.
- The research team will produce a policy brief and publish articles.
- The project will run from July 23 October 24.
